Independence Day Celebrations at the Consulate General of India, Toronto

















The 72nd Independence Day was celebrated by the Consulate General of India, Toronto on 15 August 2018 at the Consulate premises with traditional gaiety and fervor. The unfurling of the Indian flag by the Consul General, Shri Dinesh Bhatia, was followed by the National Anthem with large gathering of Indians, Persons of Indian origin and Friends of India. The event was also attended by the Members of Provincial Parliament of Ontario province and a large number of Indian Ex-Servicemen. Welcoming the audience on the occasion, the Consul General read out Hon'ble President of India's address to the nation delivered on the occasion of Independence Day. The President's address, *inter-alia*, made a mention of the fact that no matter if one is living in India or abroad, the Independence Day is sacred. Consul General even quoted Hon'ble External Affairs Minister of India, Smt. Sushma Swaraj who has repeatedly said that Indian Embassy is a home away from home. He informed everyone about the success of the Open House that was initiated by him in April 2016 on every Friday; nearly 3200 people took advantage of this initiative. Consul General spoke about the various Independence Day celebrations taking place all across Canada including the tricolor illumination of the iconic Niagara Falls, which would culminate in the grand India Day Parade and Nathan Phillips Square in Toronto on 19 August. He concluded by conveying greetings and congratulations to all Indians, Indo-Canadians and friends of India. The students of Guru Tegh Bahadur International School, Brampton presented a Shabad followed by the recital of Vande Mataram by students of Sathya Sai School.

The Reception was attended by over 500 people which included Diplomats, Senators, MPs and Ontario Ministers & MPPs as well as prominent Indians & Indo-Canadians. Classical singing by Hemang Mehta and Vande Mataram dance by Lata Pada's troupe enthralled everyone. Consul General addressed the gathering and touched upon many facets of India's Independence which we celebrate. While this list is understandably too long given that India is most diverse country in the world, he specifically mentioned some of them, epitomized in the form of alphabets C-D-E-F-G. The 'C' stands for India's Culture and Civilization. The 'D' stands for the Indian diaspora of which most of you are members. The 'E' is Indian economy which we are proud of. The 'F' is Indian Films and Fashion. Last, but not the least, is Indian 'G' that means Indian Gastronomy. He concluded by saying that Toronto is uniquely placed to have presence of all the above facets and, that too, in more than ample amount. These collectively project an image of India that is nourishing, flourishing and magnificent; India i.e. Bharat.

India Day Festival and Grand Parade 2018





















Grand India Day Parade took place on Sunday, 19 August 2018 at Nathan Phillips Square in Downtown Toronto. The parade, organised by Panorama India and supported by the Consulate witnessed an unprecedented participation of over 75,000 people surpassing the last year's record of 60,000 people attending the grand event. The Parade had over 400 entertainers on the main stage, including Bollywood Star Jimmy Shergill, "King of Bhangra" Malkit Singh and Indo-Canadian singer Geeta Zaildar and Parichay. The event also had dozens of information, retail and food booths and 17 colourful flatbed floats travelling through the city's downtown. Consul General addressed the gathering and began by dedicating the event to our beloved former Prime Minister Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee Ji, who left for heavenly abode on 16 August 2018. He inaugurated the Parade by paying tributes & observing 1 minute of silence in memory of the departed leader. He explained the relevance and purpose of organising the India Day Parade while stressing on the strong India Canada bilateral relations.

The event had representation from the Federal Government of Canada, Official Opposition, Government of Ontario and Mayor's Office. Some the key leaders included Hon.
